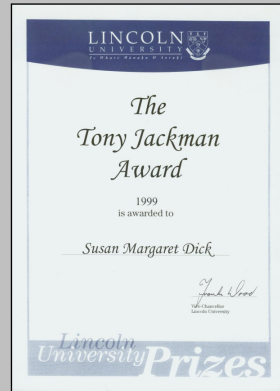

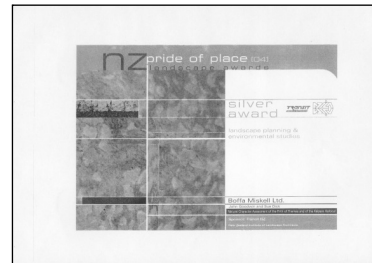
The TONY JACKMAN AWARD is awarded each year by the University of Lincoln to the BLA graduating landscape architect who achieves the highest marks in design and academic work.

Judges' Citation

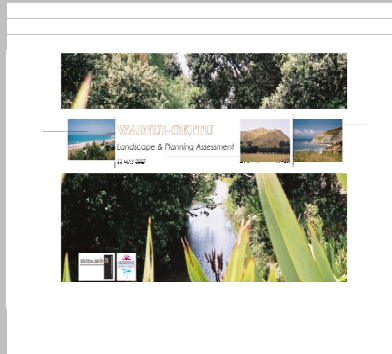
The particular feature of this study is the way it clearly presents a rational method of assessment for a complex issue spanning both marine and land-based parts of the coastal environment. It combines a scoring method with qualitative descriptors of landscape modification which will provide a robust framework for policy development. The scoring technique used has its limitations and it would have been helpful if an interpretation of each of the landscape zones had been incorporated within the report, to enable future users to fully understand the relative contribution of the different dimensions of natural character that were assessed. In being linked to guidelines prepared for the MfE in its environmental performance indicator programme this entry develops and implements a methodology which can be integrated within a wide policy context.

This entry is deserving of a silver award for developing a robust analytical approach to ma planning issue of wide interest and relevance.

Judges' Citation

This assessment promotes better management of the land resource and informs decisions about zone management and plan changes in light of growth pressure and new infrastructure. The project achieves merit for its understanding of the critical relationship between landscape assessment and district plan policy development. Sue Dick recognised that the existing zone boundaries conveyed no particular relationship to topographical features or transitions between identity areas. She included detailed management tools. From this she developed zoning recommendations. This is a thorough and well-structured report. It is a highly proficient and professional example of landscape assessment. The assessment process is clearly stated. Community values are incorporated and the presentation is excellent
